Parliament at Satya's Village Centre assumes office



One day in March, during lunch at Satya's Muttrampet Village Resource Centre, our student Kowshik approached our staff with a problem: one of the students had brought lunch that had spoiled.

"We cannot let him eat this," he said, "we must tell his parents."

The staff member complied. After all, Kowshik was the minister of health at the newly formed children's parliament at the centre. Kowshik's prime minister Karthick Raja and his cabinet had been sworn in just over a month earlier, as part of Satya's effort to inculcate life skills and an appetite for self-advocacy among students.

The precursor to the children's parliament was the APJ Abdul Kalam Children's Club that was formed in January. On National Voters' Day, January 25, the staff at Muttrampet decided to form a children's parliament, as an opportunity to learn critical life skills and encourage their grounding in self-advocacy and participation in society. After an orientation, the actual process began with symbols allotted to candidates who filed their nominations. The symbols were selected as things that the students saw everyday and were familiar with: apple, comb, mixie, light bulb, car, clock, etc.

Parliament at Satya's Village Centre assumes office



Voting was held on February 10, and the results were declared on the 13th. The oath-taking ceremony was held on 17th February. The cabinet comprises: Kowshik as the minister of health, Kandasamy and Yugasri as the joint ministers of education, Dharani as the minister of sports, and Anburaj as the minister of child welfare and agriculture.

Since taking over, the parliament has been a bridge between the students and the staff, and also participate in other activities: helping conduct an inclusive science day with the local government school, for instance.

Plans are on to expand the concept of the parliament to the local school, which will be an inclusive children's parliament.

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Satya enables disability card!

Our outreach program helps the disabled access government schemes as well. Mr. Balamurugan, 20, of Sedurapet village, Villianur, who has an intellectual disability, did not receive any social security benefits because he did not have a disability ID card. Getting a card was proving to be difficult for him.

Satya followed up with the government departments and after two years of continuous followup, he has now received his certificate, which enables him to receive the pension of Rs 2000 per month.



Mirthula Happy to be mainstreamed!



Mirthula, now 12, has cerebral palsy and intellectual disability. She was identified by our Mobile Therapy Unit during their services, and has now been receiving therapy.

She has now improved enough that she could get integrated into the local government school. She now studies in Class 6, on par for her age. While she found it difficult to cope with the school environment in the beginning, she now loves going to school and has lots of friends as well.

INCLUSION



third inclusive classroom 0ur was inaugurated at the Rm A.S. Packirisamy Pillai GHS- Karaikalmedu in Karaikal on 8th of February! 0ur earlier inclusive classrooms are in Lawspet and Thirubuvanai, Pondicherry.

In Karaikal, a pre-assessment of three schools threw up alarming results: 62% of children were at the beginner level in Tamil,



and the corresponding figures for English and Maths were 49% and 25%. This meant that remedial education for children with learning disabilities and difficulties was the essential first step to creating truly inclusive classrooms. Satya has started remedial education for 25 of these children.

During the inauguration, the chief educational officer Mr. K.Rajasekaran spoke about the significance of the inclusive classroom in creating a supportive learning environment for all students.

An inclusive game session was also conducted to promote inclusion as part of sports for young athletes.
